Dear Parents and Guardians,

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome everyone to the start of a new school year. We have many exciting events and opportunities waiting for all of the young women of Saint Dominic Academy. Our faculty has been eagerly awaiting and preparing, and is very excited to begin working with the students once again.

This year is the first year SDA will be offering online classes through the Virtual High School program. This program was initially open to seniors only as it is in its early stages, but we hope to open offerings to other grade levels in future years. In addition to this, there will be eight students taking classes at Saint Peter's University this year.

As we begin the new school year, I would also like to give a few reminders. If your Edline account does not work for any reason, please contact Mrs. Barbara Good at 201-434-5938, ex.35. If you have any concerns at all about your daughter's progress, I ask that you contact her guidance counselor immediately so the proper steps can be taken.

Finally, I invite you to contact me at any point during the year should any questions arise regarding the academic program. I think that returning parents would agree that any phone calls/emails to my office were always returned in a timely manner, so please, do not hesitate to contact me with any questions at all. When school opened on September 5, 2013, Saint Dominic Academy celebrated two momentous occasions; the beginning of its 135^{th} anniversary year and the opening of a 7^{th} and 8^{th} grade program.

School began for the newest and youngest members of the Saint Dominic Academy community with an 8:30 a.m. orientation breakfast for both students and parents. At 8:30 a.m. the girls in 7th and 8th grade were greeted by their SDA "Big Sisters," members of the sophomore class, who assisted further with their orientation program. Later in the morning, the Academy welcomed transfer students and then returning students. Classes began officially for grades 7-12, on Friday, September 6, 2013. An Opening School Liturgy took place on Friday, September 13 at 11:00 a.m. at St. Aloysius Church on West Side Avenue.

Saint Dominic Academy has announced that it has adopted Project Lead the Way (PLTW) and will begin offering courses in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) for those students in the 7th and 8th grades. PLTW is the nation's leading provider of STEM curricula to middle and high schools with more than 5,300 programs in over 4,700 schools in all 50 states and the District of Columbia.

The Academy will offer PLTW's Gateway to Technology program which is a program that engages the natural curiosity and imagination of middle school students, while introducing them to engineering, robotics, computer modeling, and energy, among other STEM-related subjects. "PLTW has a long history of successfully engaging students in STEM subjects," said John Seborowski, Academic Dean. In July, SDA faculty member Christina Manuel attended an intensive multi-day PLTW training session. In addition to providing world-class STEM curricula to middle and high school schools, PLTW provides ongoing, high-quality professional development training for middle and high school teachers so they can effectively implement - and teach - the engaging, hands-on, project-based curriculum.

Cross Country - Now in its 35th year, the 2013 XC season began practice on June 24, nine days after competing at the Outdoor Nationals in Greensboro, North Carolina. The team is poised to have a wonderful season which began in Lincoln Park with the biggest ever Saint Dominic Academy Cross Country Invitational. This 19th Annual meet had 30 teams competing, from eight counties all across New Jersey, including many of the state's best. Joining the Cross Country coaching staff is 2009 SDA Scholar-Athlete **Kristina Jimenez**, who recently completed her collegiate running career at University of Scranton.

Soccer - The team should do very well in Hudson County this year led by a core of nine seniors. The team is coached by **Alyssa Sita'07** and **Stefanie Philips'07**, both of whom played soccer during their time at the Academy. In fact, Philips was the 2007 SDA Scholar-Athlete. Student Council president **Cara Keating** should lead the veteran Blue Devil squad.

SDA students and teacher attend Dominican Preaching Conference

For six days this past summer, three Saint Dominic Academy students and two teachers were participants in the Dominican High Schools Preaching Conference held at Siena Heights University in Adrian, Michigan. SDA was one of twenty-four Catholic high schools from across the United States and Puerto Rico to attend the annual conference.

The Dominican High Schools Preaching Conference gives students the opportunity to meet new friends and learn about being a follower of Saint Dominic. The conference empowers high school students to discover and deepen the preacher within themselves through the ways of Dominican life: Prayer, Study, Community and Interaction with members of the Dominican family. The conference also taught the lives of the Dominican saints.

According to the conference website (<u>www.domlife.org</u>) : "Dominicans share their faith by preaching. We preach through words, arts, music and action. We preach not only by what we say and how we live, but also by who we are. Dominicans have been practicing the art of preaching for over 800 years with their founder St. Dominic."

The goal of the conference was to assist participants in recognizing how they preach in their own daily lives, so they could then empower others to preach.

Each day of the conference guest speakers offered programs focused on a particular theme, which included: "Preaching in the Dominican Tradition," "Preaching the Signs of Our Times," "Dominican Preaching In Action," "Preaching Through the Creative Arts," and "Our Call to Preach the Good News"

Juniors Shannon Hester and Melissa Mercado along with faculty members Mahalia Armea and Joan Simon were participants at the conference. According to Armea, SDA Religion teacher, "This was my second year attending the conference and I enjoyed it. I have learned what it is to be a Dominican. I suggest that other teachers go to this conference so that they will truly understand what it means to teach in a Dominican school."

Also in attendance was junior **Brittany Angrosina** who had this to say, "Throughout the week I spent at the conference, I learned what it means to be a true Dominican preacher. I learned a lot about Saint Dominic and the Dominican Tradition. My eyes were opened to how important it is for SDA as a Dominican Community to give back to society. As President of the Dominican Youth in Action Club, I hope to share everything I learned from the conference with the other club members, and get them excited to become more active in our community activities."

On June 10th, 2013, ten students from Saint Dominic Academy, along with six students from Lacordaire Academy, met **Mrs. Guen Farrales** and Sister Marie Mueller at Newark International airport to begin their journey to Frankfurt, Germany. After their seven hour flight, the group met their EF Tour Guide, Corrine, and Florian, their friendly, Italian bus driver. They joined several other groups from Alabama, Texas, Oklahoma, and Minnesota.

The group set out on their first adventure to the small town of Rothenburg, Germany. They enjoyed walking the cobblestone streets of the walled in city and trying the favorite local dessert called "snowballs". On the third day in Germany, the group traveled to Neuschwanstein Castle, former home of the King of Bavaria, Ludwig II. Before hiking up to the castle, they had lunch nearby and celebrated SDA student Sarah Marks' sixteenth birthday. After exploring Neuschwanstein Castle, the group drove to Munich for dinner. The fourth day in Germany began with a bus tour around Munich where the group admired the hundred year old Rathaus-Glockenspiel and St. Peter's Church tower. Some students took a bike tour around Munich while others used their free time to shop and try local food. After lunch they drove to Dachau, concentration camp. The camp was open for twelve long years and was the first concentration camp ever made. It was an eye-opening experience for many students on the trip.

The next stop on SDA's European trip was Italy. On the fifth day the group stopped for lunch and free time in Austria on their way to the hotel in Padova, Italy. An unexpected bus problem allowed the group to explore a small town in Italy and admire its church, St. Margaret's, which included hand painted ceilings and elaborately carved pews. After getting a new bus, Florian got the group back on track to Italy, while allowing a beautiful view of the surrounding mountains. On day six, the group took a boat ride to Venice, Italy. Before taking a short walking tour, the group watched a glass blowing demonstration. Their day in Venice included trying various types of traditional Italian food, shopping, and enjoying the beautiful, hot weather. Their day in Venice ended with a gondola ride. The next stop on their trip was Switzerland. On the way, the group stopped in Verona, Italy. There they saw the Arena di Verona which first opened in 30 AD and now seats 15,000 people. They also visited Juliette's balcony and placed a lock that read SDA GIRLS 2013 along with the locks of many on a gate nearby. After leaving Verona, the group travelled through the longest tunnel in Europe and arrived at their quaint hotel in the hills of Switzerland. On day eight the group took a tour around the city of Lucerne and walked along the Chapel Bridge. After eating a short lunch near the water, they took a ferry to Mount Pilatus where they began their journey up 7,000 feet into the Swiss Alps. The group climbed the mountain's peaks and admired the breathtaking views seen from the top. After descending the mountain some students went to a nearby lake to swim and play soccer while others returned to the city. After their busy day the group returned to the hotel to relax and get ready to head back to Germany.

On the group's last day they traveled back to Germany. They made a short stop at Rhine Falls in Switzerland and continued on to the Black Forest in Germany. At the Black Forest the group learned about cuckoo clocks and how they were made. To the delight of many parents, none of the students returned home with any huge grandfather cuckoo clocks. On their last long bus ride of the trip, SDA students Chelsia and Jendelly organized a small talent show which included a poetry reading and three singing groups. They also thanked Corrine and Florian on behalf of the entire group for allowing them to have such an amazing and enjoyable trip. The last site the group visited were the ruins of Heidelberg Castle in Germany. After visiting the ruins, the group walked around a nearby town where they listened to street performers and had dinner. They returned to the hotel for their last night with the other groups. They said their good-byes and prepared for their trip back home.

The next day the SDA girls, along with the Lacordaire Academy students, returned home to Newark International airport. Each and every girl had a wonderful time on the trip. They made new friendships while experiencing new cultures and traveling through various countries. The trip proved to be an amazing and educational experience. The girls encourage their SDA sisters to take advantage of the opportunities the trips offer and recommend looking into next year's European Trip. 
Saint Dominic Academy to hold 15th Annual Leadership Awards Gala

On **Thursday, November 21, 2013** Saint Dominic Academy will be holding its **15th Annual Leadership Awards Gala** to benefit the Academy's scholarship fund. The event will be held at Nanina's in the Park in Belleville, New Jersey beginning at 6:00 p.m.

This year's two Dominican Pillar Award honorees have demonstrated unflagging commitment to their respective communities and to Saint Dominic Academy.



Maryanne Kelleher is a 1990 graduate of Saint Dominic Academy and is also a graduate of Saint Peter's University. Kelleher has worked in Jersey City since 1996 and holds the position of Director of Cultural Affairs, a division that is responsible for planning more than 45 free concerts city-wide along with art exhibits, theater performances, multiethnic festivals, holiday events, civic pride celebrations and special commemorations. She has also served as a Commissioner of Jersey City's Tourism Board and has held elected office. Kelleher is a strong advocate of historic restoration, public art and expression, and Jersey City's multi-cultural community. She credits the Sisters of Saint Dominic of Caldwell for having made social justice and service core components of learning, which was only later influenced by her Jesuit education at Saint Peter's University. The Pillar Award is priceless to Kelleher who said, "It is a special thing to be honored by the community that I serve, but to have SDA reach out to me to say, 'You've done well, kid,' twenty-three years after graduation is a whole other experience all together. This is very touching and a personal honor which I will cherish for years to come."



The second Dominican Pillar Award honoree is Matthew Laracy. who along with his wife Mary Lynn, raised seven children in Jersey City, five of whom are Saint Dominic Academy alumnae. Laracy is a product of Catholic education having been educated at St. John's in Orange, Seton Hall Prep, Maryknoll College Seminary in Illinois, Seton Hall University, and Teacher's College and Union Theological. He spent 25 years in supervision with UPS and taught religion for 11 years at St. Mary High School, Jersey City, and Immaculate Conception High School in Lodi. Over the years he has been active as a parish catechist. For the last four years, he has managed Magnificat Home, a residence for women, especially those with low-income and special needs, at 119 Clerk Street, formerly Our Lady of Sorrows Convent. Magnificat Home is a non-profit boarding home, started by the Laracy family and their friends. (Magnificathome.org.) He is passionate about his Catholic faith, his large and growing family, and the women and collaborators of Magnificat Home.



This year's third honoree is Young Alumna on the Move, Jessica lorio '02. An active resident of the Bayonne community, lorio was an honors graduate of Quinnipiac University. She is currently the Business Director of Wealth Management for Hightower Advisors in New York City, where she began her career in 2008 as a Registered Associate in the same division. Prior to that, she was a Client Services Associate in Wealth Management for Morgan Stanley. She is a volunteer/referee for the Bayonne Youth Soccer Association and served as the Head Varsity Soccer Coach for Holy Family Academy for six years.

As the Academy celebrates its 135th Anniversary, invited special guests to the gala include the **Sisters of Saint Dominic of Caldwell** who had worked at Saint Dominic Academy and the **Academy's current faculty, staff and recent retirees.**

The Saint Dominic Academy Leadership Awards Gala begins at 6:00 p.m. with a spectacular cocktail reception followed by a buffet dinner. There are both live and silent auctions held throughout the evening as well as a "Fund a Scholar" segment.

Proceeds from the Gala benefit the scholarship fund which supports young women who are academically capable of excelling at the Academy, but financially unable to do so. The Saint Dominic Academy Class of 2013 was awarded over \$8.1 million in college

academic scholarships and 99% of the graduates have gone on to attend college.
