## Saint Dominic Academy holds 137th Commencement Exercises

On Sunday, May 31, Saint Dominic Academy held its 137th commencement exercises for the Class of 2015. Mrs. Barbara Griffin, Head of School, presided over the event held at 3:00 p.m. at St. Aedan's, the Saint Peter's University Church on Bergen Avenue. A Baccalaureate Mass and dinner were held on Tuesday, May 26 at St. Aloysius Church and the Casino in the Park respectively.

The 85 members of the Class of 2015 were collectively awarded over \$12.7 million in college scholarship and grant monies. Class co-valedictorian **Shannon Kelley** addressed those gathered at St. Aedan's Church. Shannon, recognized as a Commended Student in the 2015 National Merit Scholarship Program, also received the English award for having achieved the highest cumulative average in that subject. The recipient of many scholarships, she will attend Fairfield University in the fall.

A reflective reading was offered by **Mira Ibrahim**, the co-valedictorian. Mira, the recipient of the Business award, will attend Pace University.

At the Baccalauerate Mass on Tuesday, May 26, class salutatorian, **Anamaria Carrasco** delivered a moving address to her fellow graduates. Anamaria, the outgoing president of the Student Council, had been recognized by the National Hispanic Recognition Program (NHRP) for scoring at or above the NHRP qualifying level. Anamaria, who will attend Georgetown University in the fall, was also awarded the Spanish award.

Mrs. Griffin along with Board of Trustees chairperson, **Susan Mulvaney Odenthal '73** presented additional academic awards to the following students: French, **Mariana Gomez**, Mathematics, **Brittany Angrosina**, Religious Studies, **Arianna Howard**, Science, **Alexis O'Callahan**, Social Studies, **Elizabeth Boyle**, Physical Education, **Gillian Johnson**, and Music, **Octavia Davila**. For having achieved perfect attendance for all four years of their high school education, medals were awarded to **Brittany Angrosina**, **Lea DiPietro**, **Michelle Kwok**, and **Caroline Meehan**.

SDA Class of 1994 alumna, **Tara McCann** challenged the graduates to "run your own race with resilience and kindness." Ms. McCann holds a Bachelors Degree from Brown University and a Masters from Columbia University's Business School. She has sixteen years of experience in the field of real estate and investment banking, working for such institutions as Deutsche Bank. Most recently, she was named Chief Strategy Officer for Stone Point, where she is responsible for strategic direction in the field of Global Real Estate. Married with two children, she dedicates her time to various charities around the globe which place an emphasis on women and children and is also dedicated to supporting women in math and science careers.

In her closing remarks, Mrs. Griffiin thanked and congratulated not only the graduates, but also their parents, citing "their success is yours as well." The commencement exercises were concluded with Benediction and the Academy's "Alma Mater."

## **SDA Spring Athletics Round-Up**

**Outdoor Track & Field** - The team won the Outdoor County Relays for the second year in a row and a record 24<sup>th</sup> time, the Jersey City meet which it has not lost since 1985, the South Hudson championship which it has never lost and the County championship for the second year in a row and 19<sup>th</sup> time Outdoors. It was the 49<sup>th</sup> County title for the program. These totals are all records for girls AND boys schools. SDA won all of these meets contested during the Indoor season as well.

The team attended their 35<sup>th</sup> consecutive University of Pennsylvania Relay carnival and finished fifth in the 1,600 meter relay. The Blue Devils have medaled 14 times at Penn. The team has performed well at a host of invitationals (including the 17<sup>th</sup> Annual SDA invitational attended by 18 schools) and junior **Camille Bertholon** has set one school record and is challenging others set in 1990 by Hudson County( all sports) Hall of Famer **Liane** (**Sullivan**) **Rae'90**. **Shannon Hester** has set the school record in the Javelin and again qualified for the outdoor National championship in Greensboro, North Carolina. Hester has signed a national letter of intent to continue her running and throwing career at the University of Loyola in New Orleans. Seniors **Emily Mernar** and **Ayanna Patterson** who have both been first team all county athletes plan to compete on the collegiate level as well at Loyola (Baltimore) and St. Peter's, respectively.

**Softball** - The team, which has enjoyed a resurgent two years under coach Mike Nieves completed their season on May 19<sup>th</sup> with a state tournament loss at Pope John 23. The Blue devils were the # 4 seed in North Parochial. SDA claimed a share of our division title (with Bayonne) when they defeated Marist on May 18<sup>th</sup>. The Blue devils led by standout pitcher **Christina Mezey** and six other seniors finished the season with a 17-8 ledger which represents a dramatic improvement from the recent past.

Senior Scholar Athletes- **Toni Giacchi** was recognized by the NJSIAA and **Shannon Hester** was honored as the St. Dominic Academy scholar athlete at the Senior Honors Awards assembly.

## Parking Restrictions around the SDA Campus

The Jersey City Council has adopted an ordinance which restricts parking in certain streets around the Academy, effective June 1, 2015. The restriction is from 3:00 pm to 9:00 pm, Monday through Friday, in the designated zone.
