In the Classroom:

Social Studies

- While students study History, they rarely have a chance to change History. Advanced Placement I students in Dr. Santora's class have been given that very opportunity. The class is studying the American Civil War. As a part of their studies, students have each been assigned different Civil War battles and have been directed to prepare their research from either the Northern or the Southern perspective. One of the skills required in the AP course is the ability of students to evaluate documents from the author's viewpoint, the intended audience, the document's purpose, or the document's perspective. In addition to completing that task, the students have also been directed to identify the defining moment of the battle where the outcome has been determined and one side appeared to have triumphed. However, after identifying that moment, the students will go on to develop their own "What If" moment where a different outcome is projected based on a series of alternative developments. The results may be quite challenging and may have changed the outcome of the conflict. While interesting to ponder, in the end students will realize that the only way to really change History is to study it and use those lessons not to repeat it.
- The 7th and 8th grade US History class has started studying the Great Depression. In order to help them understand the role that the stock market crash of 1929 played in the Great Depression, students have joined a class contest on a virtual stock market website. Each student has been given \$1,000,000 in virtual currency with instructions to invest as much of it as they like in at least 5 different stocks. While they follow their progress over the course of 3 weeks, the students are also completing assignments covering topics such as, "What is a Stock", "How to Build a Portfolio", and "How is Money Created", among others. The week of March 7th, the students will find out who in the class made the best investments and the top 3 investors will win small prizes.
- AP Art History has just concluded a project charting the repatriation process both nationally and internationally for the Benin Bronzes of the Nigerian people. Students using research documents chart the lengthy and complicated process by which institutions such as the Smithsonian, RISD, and the MET address the problematic history and providence of these art acquisitions as well as how colonization and conquest has contributed to the loss of African culture. Students also discussed ways in which these institutions have made progress towards restitution through the return of cultural works, the rewriting of museum documents to reflect history accurately as well as dialogues from contemporary Benin artists. This activity helped students to view artworks as living, breathing cultural documents and not the relic of a bygone age.



In the Classroom:
